New year, new unit: In the wake of an investigation into a Memphis detective, District Attorney Amy Weirich <u>has created a new unit to investigate officers' conduct</u>. Loews about to go high: Construction on the city's new, 16-story convention center hotel should begin in March. Loews <u>received final approval for the project Wednesday</u> from the Downtown Design Review board as well as <u>City Council approval Tuesday</u> for changes to the drop-off area. Quick. The Land Use Control Board <u>approved half of Union Row's first phase</u> Thursday, putting it on track to be approved by the Memphis City Council.

Odds on the economy: A University of Tennessee economist is predicting a 30 percent chance of a recession in the next two years and said the killing of Iran Gen. Qassem Soleimani "will do nothing to diminish economic growth," <u>according to a recent Daily Memphian story</u>. Economist Matt Murray said that current warlike events raise "jitters" but shouldn't cause a recession without a full-scale military conflict or a shock to the system, such as the interruption of oil.

A decade of change: Sometimes it is nice to look back and see how far we've come. Feature writer Jill Johnson Piper recently reminded us how much <u>Memphians have changed</u> in the past 10 years, and it's nostalgia in the best possible way.

E-commerce and the airport: <u>UPS</u> is expanding its operations at <u>Memphis</u> International. The shipping company recently pulled a \$23 million building permit for the expansion, which comes just four years after an \$80 million upgrade at its Swinnea Road facility.
